Oklahoma Dressage Society 2018 Recognized Show Awards Rules

General Program Rules:

- Award year is October 1, 2017 to September 30, 2018.
- Rider Must be an ODS member in good standing on the date of the ride.
- Horse Must be registered with ODS on the date of the ride.
- The horse and rider are considered a team for each level of competition.
- A horse/rider combo may not repeat as champion at the same level in succeeding years (FEI excluded).
- Awards will be presented at the Annual General Meeting or Awards Banquet.

Score Requirements:

- Minimum of five scores per level except FEI which requires a minimum of four scores per level.
- Minimum of three different judges.
- At least one score from the top test of the level (excluding Introductory Level).
- All scores must be from USEF/USDF shows.
- At least two scores must be from Oklahoma Dressage Society shows.
- 2013 rider tests (training, 1st and 2nd) will **NOT** count toward year end award scores.

Submission Requirements and Award Divisions

- All eligible scores will be used to calculate the median.
- Year-End Awards will be presented to the following levels. Awards are 1st 6th in all divisions at all levels unless noted otherwise:

2018 10 reasons to make a new year's resolution to become a better partner for your horse......Ridermanship®

- **1. This is NOT an exercise course!** Be prepared to study the biomechanics of the body and learn how your Psoas, abdominals and gluts work together—or don't, for proper riding.
- **2. Be prepared to change.** This course is about changing your "way of going." Stop being a pedestrian on a horse and begin to retrain your body to move in a different way! After all, if you do what you have always done, you will get what you always get.
- **3. You will learn that dressage is not a mystery.** A half halt is just the reorganizing of your self-carriage. But do you know what rider self-carriage is?
- **4. Learn to self-carry like a dancer.** You will develop your body to have the presence and grace of a dancer, or the elegance of an FEI rider.
- **5.** You will learn exercises...but you will learn to do them in a way that will CHANGE your posture. Getting fit is ok, but it doesn't help change the way you carry your skeleton around. Doing exercise without being "through" is like doing shoulder in without being on the bit. It is just movement. Learning HOW to do the exercises while being through, on the bit, engaged in the haunches correctly is key to changing how you self-carry.
- **6.** Are you tired of your seat leaving the saddle and bouncing on your horse? Go watch a video of yourself— if you see space between your seat and the saddle, you are banging on your horse's back with every stride. Think about what that does to your horse. This course will give you the tools to change your riding position and biomechanics to stabilize your spine while being able to open and close your hips freely, much like a saloon door will swing open and close...only it will be your horse swinging through your hips. Only then will your full seat breeches help you stay in the saddle:)
- 7. Frustrated your horse goes beautifully with your trainer, but you can't seem to get him to move that way? It's not because you are not capable. It is because you have never been taught how to use your body that invites the horse to move underneath you. Dressage trainers are not body experts-they are horse experts. Very few have the same expertise in how the human body works to be able to troubleshoot your physical issues.
- **8. You owe it to your horse.** If my husband and I wanted to do ballroom dancing, and he took lessons to learn how, but I just showed up on the dance floor without any training...how fair is that? I would block his progress with my untrained movements.
- **9. You will do anything for your horse.** Buy it a new saddle, get the best saddle pads, the best bridle. How much would you pay to make your horse comfortable?
- **10.** It is the right thing to do. It is hard to face yourself. I know. As a dancer I faced myself every day in the studio in a leotard and tights. It is not easy to realize it's not your horse, but it's you. It is a brave rider who will look at themselves and commit to change.

Symposium with Steffen Peters

A few years ago, I was fortunate enough to attend the USDF FEI Trainers Symposium and watch one of our best Olympic riders, Steffen Peters, teach and ride for two enlightening days. It was great to review my notes and refresh Steffen's philosophy in my own mind. I've condensed my notes for this month's newsletter.

The theme throughout was consistent for every horse; the goal was the same: connection, self-carriage, and how do we evaluate and find these elusive feelings? Steffen used the various movements of training to evaluate the quality of connection and the ability of the horse to maintain it. Movements were used and addressed for each ride, but the movement done for itself was not the most important thing ~ it was merely a tool to be used to evaluate the underlying more important principle of connection and self-carriage. The tone of the symposium dominated every direction or suggestion from Steffen: be a *coach* for the horse, keeping his mental and physical well-being in mind with everything e do. As riders, instructors or trainers, we must go beyond seeing what we don't like about a movement and try to understand why.our.request.ou/why.our.request.ou/ didn't produce what we wanted from the horse. What is the root cause of why the transition, the half-pass, the change was rough or awkward or late? Nothing was done that added more confusion, tension, or insecurity to the horses. Corrections were calm, and beyond that, logical. "Keep it simple," Steffen frequently repeated ~ that is, break down a complex request into smaller parts to allow the horse to comprehend the request, and to find, by doing a movement in smaller and simpler steps, that the horse can discover that they actually can perform the movement with confidence. Steffen repeatedly emphasized that repeating a difficult movement again and again will not make it better. Teaching it in smaller steps, gradually adding them together and finally trying again is what will make it better.

The ongoing theme of the Symposium was making a priority of consistent connection and self-carriage designed to produce horses with reliable rideability. And what is rideability? A horse who is so tuned to the aides that responses come easily and instantly to light aides; a horse who is so <u>with</u> the rider that riding becomes simpler and simpler, so that in the moment of a movement or a test, there doesn't have to be attention devoted to the details of connection and self-carriage, they are so automatic, and attention then can go to precision and accuracy. Steffen said in the midst of an advanced test there simply isn't time to have any discussion about connection, suppleness, thoroughness ~ those qualities have to become so automatic, simplified, that the rider can focus on other things about the performance. He repeatedly asked two questions: 1) Is the horse <u>always</u> in front of the leg? 2) Is he in self-carriage/in control of his own balance- that is, not leaning on the rein at all nor being held by the rider for control or support? If the answer was 'yes' to both it meant the horse was in a consistent connection with the rider's hand, and was, therefore, 'rideable'.

Pertinent pearls of wisdom:

- Be willing as riders to <u>choose</u> when a moment is right to ask for a movement. If it is not right, just don't do the
 movement at that moment; set the horse up to succeed.
- Ask yourself as a rider: do I have the right to ask my horse for something new? ~ Only if the horse is in a position
 of confidence and balance.
- Set things up to build the horse's confidence: set them up for success in a movement.
- Perform a movement only so far as the horse can stay correct and succeed. Be willing to ride out of a movement at any point that it becomes a struggle and set it up again.
- Repeating a movement over and over (badly) does not eventually make it good. Only breaking it down into simpler steps lets the horse understand and manage to make it better.
- Let the horse feel your <u>clarity</u>, not your impatience.
- Never accept a loss of rhythm or balance. Coach them back to it. Don't just go on hoping it will fix itself. It won't.
- If a mistake is made, ask: what can I do to help the horse *understand*? Rather than correcting or blaming the horse
- Train in a way that anyone could be watching at any time.
- Train in a logical and <u>respectful</u> way (to the horse).
- A steady hand does not mean a stubborn hand.
- Bring your best self to the ride ~ physical, mental, and spiritual best.
